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When brokers boast about views, they're typically talking

about Manhattan's, but in the last decade the chatter has extended to other boroughs. If panoramic, voyeuristic views of the New York skyline are the high-end amenity you desire, there is still a chance to do so without breaking the million-dollar mark; it's just a 7 train, ferry or express bus away.

Take VUE in Brooklyn's South Slope. The 10-story tower offers owners the chance to rediscover patriotism while gazing at the Statue of Liberty. A top floor three-bedroom unit is only 1,168 square feet at a paltry \$900,000. But wow — its wide-angle views spanning Battery Park to the Upper East Side, the Verrazano Bridge, New Jersey and Staten Island are breathtaking. Inside The Residences in Jackson Heights, homeowners gaze across the East River at midtown landmarks such as the Empire State Build-

ing, Chrysler Building, United Nations and Citigroup Center for a mere \$350,000 (nearly the price of a year of Manhattan storage space).

The rooftop views from the Bronx's 20-story Solaria are out of this world — literally. The penthouse just grazes the million-dollar mark and has access to a rooftop observatory and private two-person rooftop rooms. The 360-degree daytime views are killer, looking out to the Hudson River, Tapan Zee Bridge, Westchester, Long Island and the

Palisades.

Wu-Tang Clan fans don't have to wait for a new album to catch glimpses of Staten Island's most famous export at St. George's two-bedroom condos; they're 1,133 square feet and priced around a half-million. Just imagine that recently renovated ferry a luxury liner to your all-encompassing waterfront Manhattan, Jersey City, Verrazano Bridge and Statue of Liberty views.
